A cautionary tale about strangers offering something that is too good to be true, it follows the adventures of a current day beggar in a flashback. It also alludes to the dangers of envy.	11+	20
Lazy Jack	England	Instructions must be adapted to fit the situation.	Judy Sierra & Robert Kaminski	<i>Multicultural Folktales: Stories to Tell Young Children</i>	A boy follows his mother's instructions to the letter, but they are of no use since he does not adapt them to fit the situation. At the end of the story, his senseless following of instructions pays off when he makes a rich girl laugh.	There are variations of this tale. I like (and dislike) that the hero is rewarded in the end even though he did not take the time to logically think through his mother's suggestions.	5+	4
The Queen and the Peasant Wife	India	Good fortune follows those that take care of their home regardless of their financial situation.	Margaret Read Macdonald	<i>Five Minute Tales: More Stories to Read and Tell when Time is Short</i>	A rich queen and a poor peasant switch places. The queen turns around the poor peasant's household for the better and the poor peasant leaves the queen's palace in shambles.	Tale that shows money does not affect how well one's household is kept. It also shows that laziness brings about misfortune.	5+	5

In a moment of clarity, he realizes that there is no good reason for war and stops the battle.	This is a great anti-war story to tell. I like the message that we can easily choose peace over righting ancient wrongs.	9+	5
Salting the Pudding	United States (Alabama)	Too many cooks spoil the broth.	Pleasant DeSpain	<i>Sweet Land of Story: Thirty-Six American Tales to Tell</i>	Mother asks all five of her daughters to help with the pudding and none of them have time. But they all end up adding salt to the pudding once they are done with what they were doing when their mother asked.	This is a short, silly story. I like the sense of anticipation for the pudding: just to find out that it is ruined.	7+	5
Snow-White and the Seven Dwarfs	Germany	Envy will is wicked.	Jacob & Wilhem K. Grimm	<i>The Juniper Tree: and Other Tales from Grimm</i>	A wicked stepmother is envious of her stepdaughter's beauty. Her attempts to kill her are thwarted by the seven dwarfs that have befriended her stepdaughter.	A wonderful, classic tale. It will be familiar to most in an audience, but the details may vary depending on the variations they've been exposed to.	10+	20

There are variations of this tale. A good story where trickery ultimately results in something positive. It could help with children's moral development.	5+	3

Margaret Read Macdonald	<i>Earth Care: World Folktales to Talk About</i>	Three sons inherit their father's land. The two do not follow their father's instruction to care for the land and are ultimately killed by it. The third feels a connection with the land and ends up owning it all after his brothers die.	A good tale to demonstrate the importance of the environment. Also, advises against greed and its blinding effects. It could be a good story for Earth Day or anytime of the year.	9+	8
The Three Wishes	Germany	Think before you speak.	Judy Sierra	<i>The Flannel Board Storytelling Book</i>	A man is granted three wishes by an elf that lives in a tree. The man and his wife argue over how the first wish was used and end up using the other two wishes during their argument.	There are variations of this tale. A funny story where wishes come true regardless of whether or not they are thought through.	5+	3
The Wild Swans	Denmark	Determination can overcome anything.	Hans Christian Anderson	<i>Fairy Tales</i>	A King marries an evil witch that ruins his relationships with his children. The only daughter must overcome obstacles to break the spell cast over her brothers. They take the form of swans during the day.	A sad tale with a happy ending, this story shows that when you are determined to complete a task, you can overcome any obstacle.	8+	30

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
